## A Top Health Expert Warns Against Closing Borders to Stop Ebola

A top U.S. public health official warned Monday that imposing travel bans or closing off West Africa to stop the spread of Ebola virus could actually make the situation worse.

“It is understandable that thought, ‘Let’s just close them off.’ But that just doesn’t work,” Anthony S. Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Disease, said on Fox News’ “Fox & Friends.”

“From a public health standpoint, that really doesn’t make any sense,” Dr. Fauci said. “To completely seal off and don’t let planes in or out of the West Afri-

can countries involved, then you could paradoxically make things

much worse in the sense that you can’t get supplies in, you can’t get help in, you can’t get the kinds of things in there that we need to contain the epidemic.”

Dr. Fauci’s warning came as a specially equipped airplane carrying the fifth American diagnosed

with Ebola landed in Omaha, with the patient headed for Nebraska Medical Center.

The 33-year-old patient, Ashoka Mukpo, a freelance cameraman working with NBC News to cover the Ebola epidemic in West Africa, was diagnosed with the deadly virus Thursday.

Meanwhile, the first patient diagnosed with Ebola on U.S. soil continued to fight for his life at a Texas hospital. Another possible case of Ebola, this one involving a child, was being investigated at a Delaware hospital.

## Ebola: A Country Needs to be Closed

Ebola is one of the deadliest diseases known on Earth, with a mortality rate of approximately 90%. This latest outbreak has been the worst since its discovery back in 1976, where it killed 280 out of the 318 infected, which is 88% mortality rate. March, 2013 was when the first few cases were discovered, and from there the numbers have skyrocketed to the worst outbreak, infecting more than 12 thousand so far with a death count of approximately just over 5 thousand. And, that is only in Africa. Due to people

traveling, the virus has spread to the U.S. There are approximately 10 or so cases so far, and that’s why we need to close all travel (at least for the United States) to and from West Africa, unless it spreads throughout Africa, then close off the continent altogether. If we close our borders, then we only have to deal with the minimal amount of cases possible. If the U.S. has diplomats or reporters in Africa, then they would have to stay there until the pandemic is resolved; just for the safety of all other Americans in the U.S. If we allow people that might be

infected into the U.S., then the problem will get worse, not better. I believe that the U.S. could help the people in West Africa, but not if it means risking the safety of our citizens. It may not have the best economic effect on either one of our countries, but it will have the best outcome for protecting our country and Africa, as well to resolve this Ebola epidemic that’s raging through our lands. That’s why we should close our borders.

## How to Survive a Zombie Apocalypse

The zombie apocalypse originated from an out of control strain of mutant rabies in early October, 2014. The zombies are now closing in on the city of Portland, Oregon, and they are rapidly making their way east. If you want to survive this apocalypse, pay attention to the important steps highlighted in this article.

In order to successfully gather survival resources, a zombie apocalypse survivor must find food, find water, and gather medical supplies. In order to find food safe for consumption, it must be canned or preserved food. The goal is to find food that will last longer. Gaining the ability to farm would ensure another way to acquire sustenance. Lack of water will cause dehydration and death. As soon as possible, one must access a safe water source and/or create a water filtration system. To ensure long-term health, it is important to learn as many medical skills as possible and acquire the skills needed to convert plants into herbal remedies.

In order to ensure proper shelter during a zombie apocalypse, one must find durable supplies to be built in a safe location with a security system. In order to survive the weather itself, you must locate durable supplies to build a safe house, such as sheet metal and lumber. It would be best to build your safe house in a remote location on high ground. The best example of this location would be at the top of a forested mountain, or somewhere surrounded mostly by water. In order to ensure the safety of all survivors at the shelter, along with your own, people will have to be willing to work around the clock fixing barriers and being lookouts. Your group will need to learn how to build snares and traps rigged to create noise whenever a zombie approaches the shelter sight. Along with warning signals, you can use the snares and traps for a dual purpose, enabling you to catch wild game like rabbits and squirrels.

In order to defend yourself successfully, you need to gain weaponry, ammunition, and the items necessary to maintain that weaponry. Necessary close-range weapons include blunt weapons and edged weapons. Necessary long-range weapons include bows, javelins, spears, and guns. In order to survive, you must also gain sustainable ammunition. It is perfectly okay to use non-traditional ammunition in emergencies. This would include, modified shotgun loads, explosive crossbow bolts, and any other insane modes of ammunition that you can imagine. Once you have built these amazing weapons, you must find necessary maintenance parts to maintain your low-maintenance weapons. You will need materials like drawstring for bows and crossbows, a cleaning kit, and a sharpener to sharpen any blades. Weapons cannot break in the middle of an attack.
