The Hanukkah miracle happened in 166 B.C. The Jews had only enough oil to light the menorah for one day. But, it kept burning for eight additional days. This led to Hanukkah becoming an eight-day celebration. The menorah has nine candles. One of the candles is used only to light the other eight candles. Candles are lit one at a time; one candle for each of the days of Hanukkah. During Hanukkah, people play with dreidels, eat food that's been deep fried in oil, and exchange gifts.

Día de los Reyes celebrates the three wise men; festivities include writing letters to the three kings, and opening gifts. January 6th is known as Epiphany, which is the 12th day of Christmas and when the three kings came and gave gifts to baby Jesus. Mexican children get to open their gifts on this day instead of the 25th of December. Before the holiday ensues, the children write letters to

the three kings. The night before, the children will put out their shoes with hav in them to feed the camels belonging to the three kings. The morning of the holiday, the hav in the children's shoes will be replaced with gifts. On kings day, they make a sweet bread called Rosca de Reves. It is a sweet bread with candied fruit on top, and a figurine of baby Jesus baked inside. The person who finds the figurine has to treat everyone to tamales.

Kwanzaa celebrates African heritage, and involves lighting seven candles to celebrate the seven principles of the holiday. Kwanzaa was created in 1966, and is celebrated on December 26th through January 1st. Kwanzaa celebrates seven principles of African heritage, which are called Nguzo Saba: Umoja (Unity), Kujichagulia (self determination), Ujima (collective work and responsibility), Ujamaa (cooperative

Economics), Nia (purpose), Kuumba (creativity), and Imani (faith). The celebration of Kwanzaa includes the lighting of seven candles; one candle for each day of the celebration. The candles are in three different colors: red. green, and black. Red represents blood shed by the African people, black represents the faces of African people and green represents hope and the color of the motherland. Three green candles are on the left the black candle is in the center, and the red candles are on the right. Hanukkah, Día de los Reyes, and Kwanzaa have similarities and differences. The similarities include that every culture is celebrating something that is important to them. Differences include traditions, and foods eaten on those days. Most importantly, every holiday involves giving to others.

Mistletoe

"The ancient Celts believed mistletoe to have magical healing powers and used it as an antidote for poison, infertility, and to ward off evil spirits. The plant was also seen as a symbol of peace and is said that among Romans, enemies who met under mistletoe would lay down their weapons and embrace. Scandinavians associated the plant with Frigga, their goddess of love, and it may be from this that we derive the custom of kissing under the mistletoe. Those who kissed under the mistletoe had the promise of happiness and good luck the following year."

The Candy Cane

"It was not long after Europeans began using Christmas trees that special decorations were used to adorn them. Food items such as candies and cookies, were used predominantly and straight white candy sticks were one of the confections used as ornamentation. Legend has it that during the 17th century, craftsmen created white sticks of candy in the shape of shepherds' crooks at the suggestion of the choirmaster at Cologne Cathedral in Germany. The candy treats were given to children to keep them quiet during ceremonies at living crèche, or Nativity scene, and the custom of passing out candy crooks at such ceremonies soon spread throughout Europe, According to National Confectioners Association, in 1847 German immigrant August Imgard used the candy cane to decorate a Christmas tree in Wooster, Ohio. More than 50 years later Bob McCormick of Albany, Georgia supposedly made candy canes as treats for family, friends and local shopkeepers. McCormick's brother in law, Catholic priest Gregory Keller, invented a machine in 1950s that automated the production of candy canes, thus eliminating the usual laborious process of creating the treats and the popularity of the candy cane grew.

More recent explanations of the candy cane's symbolism hold that the color white represents Christ's purity, the red the blood he shed, and the presence of three red stripes the holy trinity. While factual evidence of these notions does not exist, they have become increasingly common and at times are even represented as fact. Regardless, the
