

Oregon high schools are struggling to increase their graduation rates. The Oregons class of 2013 had a 69% graduation rate, ranking them 46th. According to the federal report, the only reason Oregon did not rank 50th is because Idaho was unable to report an accurate percentage of their school's graduation rate. Oregon wasn't always ranked this low. In 2012 Oregon was ranked 46th, with Nevada being the lowest, followed by three other states who were unable to report their rates by the federal government's standards. Chief Rob Saxton and Oregon chief of education officer, Nancy Golden agree that Oregon's


graduation rates are much too low. They also caution citizens with our rankings because graduation requirements vary from state to state.

Originally, Oregon only counted students who graduated. However in 2014, Oregon counted the students who received modified diplomas and students who are attending high school for an extra year to get their diploma. By including modified diplomas and students who are enrolled for an extra year, Oregon's percentage rate increased to 72% in 2014. This means that about 12,800 students did not graduate in 2014. Researchers believe

that students are suffering from chronic absenteeism. Chronic absenteeism by Google's definition is, "Missing 10 percent of a school year for any reason," which is believed as one of the contributing factors to students dropping out. In order to help students avoid chronic absenteeism. Oregon is debating not having school on Fridays. Oregon is also going to start promoting early literacy programs in attempts to get students to read by the third grade and get an early start unlike the grades before them.

with 16 points as Janet Guzman dropped 11 points.



There is 2013 law that allows administrators to request a student's login information when the

school suspects cyberbullying has been happening outside of school, or if any other school rules have been broken. This your child has an account on a social networking website, e.g., Facebook, Instagram, Twitter,



law has now taken place at a school district in Illinois, at the Triad Community Unit School District #2, where a letter was sent

to parents letting the guardian know that the school district is allowed to ask students for their social media logins if they suspect cyberbullying is happening outside of school. In the article "Can a School demand your Facebook or

ask.fm, etc., please be aware that state law requires school authorities to notify you that your child may be asked to




provide his or her password for these accounts to school officials in certain circumstances." With this being said, some parents are okay with school accessing their adolescent social media account, but

> do not agree to have their children hand them their password and personal information that is not acceptable most parents. The school says that they only sent the letter out to parents to let them know about the

law, and distributed it widely around the Illinois Association of School Boards, but they haven't had to ask a student for

> his or her password yet. Others argue that this law if violating Facebook's term of use that doesn't allow users to share their password with others, or let someone else access their account.

Seventieth Anniversary of the Liberation of Auschwitz

January 27, 2015 has marked the 70 year anniversary of the Auschwitz camp's liberation. An estimated amount of one

million Jewish people were killed in the camp during the Holocaust. Auschwitz was liberated in 1945 and was opened back again in 1947 as a museum. As of January 27, 2015

some 300 survivors of Auschwitz returned to the camp to be celebrated under a giant tent. There were several anniversary ceremonies that took place in other parts of Europe and at Israel's Holocaust, Yad Vashem. Germans honored the Jews deaths by putting flowers right next to the railway platforms in Berlin where they were taken to the

camp. People who survived Auschwitz and are still alive today were children back in 1945, but are elderly now, and this was the last expected significant anniversary where most of them will gather together. Ever since the camp's liberation, this

event seems to be the only place where most of Auschwitz survivors can gathered back together. Jews that were prisoners

during the
Holocaust
described
what they
went through
and how families were
separated.
Once they
were taken,
they were divided between people
who went di-

rectly to labor, and those who went straight to the gas chambers. Roman Kent, born in 1929 says, "We survivors do not want our past to be our children's future," by this being said the survivors do not want newer generations to go through what they went through.
