

Be Safe Be Respectful Be Responsible PBIS/SRR

On the first morning of the 2018-19 school year, Sherman students made their rounds by Homeroom groups, finding Expectation Stations and learning the rules and standards of Positive Behavior Intervention Support (PBIS). The stations taught the rules and expectations for the library, buses, bathrooms, office, lockers, hallways, and cafeteria. This is the second year of using the PBIS school management philosophy.

PBIS is designed to provide instruction of the 'whys' and lifelong values of being safe, respectful, and responsible (SRR) with an emphasis on rewarding students for these citizenship behaviors far more than punishing them for their poor choices. "The students here have the basic guidelines of PBIS and it makes the job of a teacher a lot easier," said Mrs. Gunderson, the new Spanish Language teacher. "The PBIS expectations are valuable life habits everywhere and all the time," advised Principal Mike Somnis.

"I like how it makes us teachers remember to say nice things to students, complimenting students or even asking how their day was; it shows the students you care," second-year Social Studies teacher, Mr. Stuart said. "PBIS was a big turn-around for my last school."

Constitution Day Substitute

Through the power of metaphysical magic, Abraham Baldwin was, as last year, 'substituting' for Mr. Zacharias in English classes on Constitution Day, September 17th. Back pestering students with those famous questions: What is a Constitution? Why is a Constitution important? What is particularly important about the United States' role in Constitutional history? (See p.7 for his answers) Sadly, answers were often vague or incomplete, showing how a yearly reminder (required by Federal law) is necessary and perhaps too infrequent. Mr. Baldwin, a Yale graduate, served as a Chaplain in the Revolutionary War and was a Georgia delegate to the Constitutional Convention in the summer of 1787. He voted for and signed the Constitution; then served in the first House of Representatives and later in the Senate. He had previously served in the Georgia legislature where he wrote the first public education bill of any jurisdiction in the US and organized its first university, UGA today.

As a delegate in the Confederated Congress (the first formal US government), he also supported the national university portion of the Land Ordinance of 1785. He sadly reports, however, that neither public education K-12 nor higher came into existence in his physical lifetime.

"I have enjoyed my time with the students at Sherman County these past two years and hope the tradition continues; the metaphysical magic that brings me to Moro provides me great joy at seeing my public education vision actually in existence," Mr. Baldwin stated before slipping back to the beyond.

The Husky football mantra for 2018 will undoubtedly become tiny (*in numbers*) but mighty (*in spirit*). The nine-senior lead squad of 17 from a year ago is no more; just two seniors lead a mere dozen onto the gridiron this fall.

Yet, Coach Mike Somnis noted of the young squad, "I am very proud of such a young team working really hard. As such a very young team I am proud of what they are doing."

After opening with two significant scoreboard deficits, at home against Elkton and league opener at Pilot Rock/Nixyaawii, the team's learning curve and competitiveness surged at home against Arlington Sept. 14, and in a late-game, one-touchdown loss at Union the following week. But then, new challenges on the journey hit in preparation for the Hall of Honor game Sept. 28 when concussions and grade deficits reduced player numbers far below twelve, resulting in a cancellation.

Coach Somnis remains optimistic that the process will produce a quality product.

"I don't see anything but an opportunity for how young our team is. Younger players have more of a chance to play. We have room for nothing but improvement due to the amount of playing time everyone is getting," he concluded.

Freshman Remington Anderson-Sheer agreed, "Starting varsity freshman year is hard but you just gotta work hard and try your best. It's going to be a growing team with all the progress we will be achieving through the year."

Testing SAT/PSAT/ASBAB


The SAT is one of the national standardized tests used for college admissions and recommend for juniors and seniors. The PSAT or pre-SAT is a similar standardized test for sophomores to provide an indication of where the student is at in their learning progress and what might be expected as an SAT score. The ASVAB is a test of basic reading, writing, and critical thinking skills to assess interest and apdatude. This is the test the armed services use for recruitment and specialty placement after enlistment.

The SAT will be administered at the High School, Saturday, Oct. 6. Students should report to the front entrance no later than 8 AM. Students will have an opportunity to take the ASVAB, Tuesday, Oct. 9 as part of the regular morning school day. An announcement for exact time and place will be made through the intercom. Result interpretations will be available through the counseling office beginning Nov. 5. The PSAT will be administered on Wednesday, Oct. 24, as part of the regular morning school day. An announcement for sophomores will be made as to the exact time and place. Those results are expected back before Winter Break.

Certain 'bench mark' scores achieved on the PSAT or SAT meet Oregon's essential skills levels for graduation.

Husky Helping Hands

With the end of September we are halfway through the first quarter and weekly grade checks are in force. Students who are failing any course are required to attend the additional study and work time each Thursday after school until 6 PM. There is an activity bus provided. Mrs. Miller is supervising Husky Helping Hands to start the fall in Room 11, with Mr. Stuart taking it back over after first quarter. Many teachers are available after school on a regular basis and should be consulted for their availability and assistance.
