She led a quartet of Sherman upper-grade students in a 4-H recruitment presentation for the upper-elementary grades during the last 40 mintues of the day. Eighthgrader Cadence Smith joined with freshman Emma Robbins and sophomores Mercedez Cardona and Patrick Ramos in educating and encouraging the elementary students to consider the practical benefits of learning-by-duing that $4-\mathrm{H}$ offers.
