As always, our top priority is the safety and well-being of our students and staff. Please understand that we make the decision to open, delay, or close school for inclement weather conditions based on an extremely thorough and continuous analysis until a final decision is made prior to 6:00 a.m. These decisions are not always perfect and are often complicated by our varied elevations and unpredictable weather in our geographically diverse county. With all of this being said, we completely understand that you as parents/guardians know what is best for your child. If you believe your child would be safer at home during inclement weather conditions, we respect and understand that decision. In addition, please understand that Mid-Columbia Bus Company buses sometimes can be delayed on regularly scheduled bus routes due to their focus on safety. If a school delay, early dismissal or closure occurs, we will communicate through our School Messenger system. This method of communication has proven to be very effective. Please remember that parents/guardians/staff can be prepared to receive prompt communication form the District by ensuring that phone numbers are up-to-date with school office staff. You can do this by calling Sherman County School at 541-565-3500. In addition, closures and delays are also reported on local TV and Radio stations and on the web at www.FlashAlert.net.

In the event we need to implement or alter certain bus routes, this may be communicated to you through the School Messenger system. Often representatives from Mid-Columbia Bus Company will personally contact certain families to communicate any alterations to transportation plans.

Lastly, we want to remind everyone of Board Policy (EBCD) regarding ½ Day Friday Schedules and emergency closures. If the District closes for a full day due to inclement weather or other emergency situations, the ½ Day Friday at the end of that week will automatically become a full day Friday unless there is a school closure on that particular Friday. When there is a 2-hour delay, the ½ Day Friday at the end of the week will not be altered. The reason behind this policy is that the Board believes students are better served by being in school as much as possible during the entire school year.



#### **Conference Stats**

With November bringing an end to the First Quarter, District Parent Conferences were held on the Thursday evening and Friday morning of the 8th and the 9th. Participation was exceptional at the K-6 level with 142 students of 157, or 90.4 percent, participating in parent-guardian meetings. At the 7-12 level participation was strong but fell down to 62 of 112, or 56.3 percent. Thus, one group gets an 'A' and . . . well it did average out to a District-wide 76.2 percent; slightly above average. The important point is to remember that education is a learning process and both home and school need each other's support in order to constantly hold students accountable for the efforts and discipline they need to practice in order to get the most of this incredible opportunity the community is offering them.
