

Superintendent's Message 'National School Counseling Week'

While we are often unaware, various organizations have picked certain months of the year to give special recognition to situations or groups that are deserving of our reflective efforts. During the month of January, a recognition of note for education was the annual recognition of those who volunteer to serve on school boards (see our Board recognition story on page 2). February presents another important education connected recognition -- National School Counseling Week -- sponsored by the American School Counselor Association (ASCA), will be celebrated from February 4–8, 2019.

This special week is a perfect opportunity to honor our school counselor at Sherman County School and those who are directly involved in counseling services, supporting student success/achievement and planning for college and career readiness.

Over the past two years, the Sherman County School District and its Board of Directors have focused on establishing an enhanced system of support for all of our students. We currently have expanded to a full-time certified K-12 Counselor/Qualified Mental Health Professional and added Student Success Support (fully funded through state-wide Measure 98 grant funds). We have also added an on-site Family Care Coordinator (fully funded through Mid-Columbia Center for Living). Though we have experienced recent turn-over in our Family Care Coordinator Position, this has led us to work collaboratively with Greater Oregon Behavioral Health, Inc., Mid-Columbia Center For Living, and local Juvenile Prevention Staff to potentially add an additional full-time Qualified Mental Health Professional that will be hired and supervised by the Sherman County School District. We strongly believe having this additional position, as part of our team, will lead to more efficient coordinated counseling services for our students and families. We are hopeful that this position (that will be fully funded by grants, with a small in-kind contribution) will begin by March of 2019. The following are brief descriptions to better familiarize our constituents with each position:

Creating a safe learning environment is also a critical part of helping each child achieve academic, social and emotional success. Two years ago, our District signed up with the Safe Oregon Tip Line. I would like to again share information regarding this additional resource for students, parents, and our communities to report safety threats.

How does the Safe Oregon Tip Line Work?

Students can access the Safe Oregon system through a link on our District's website or they may go directly to the www.safeoregon.com website. Tips can be submitted through the web form on the Safe Oregon website, or by text, email, live call, or mobile app. Around the country, research shows that the number one reason why students do not report is the fear of retaliation from their peers. Again, the Safe Oregon Tip Line can be accessed from the privacy of a phone, home computer, or other internet equipped device, eliminating the possibility of being identified by another student and thus, decreasing the likelihood that a school safety threat would go unreported. After stumbling on a long road trip to Prairie City over Winter Break, the Husky men are a perfect 12-0, with eleven of those in league action. Their performance has earned them sole possession of first place in the conference and a second place standing in the OSAA 1A Rankings.

The biggest victory in the conference race occurred this past Tuesday evening against another league unbeaten going into the contest, Horizon Christian. The Huskies showed all of their weapons with all five starters – Tyler, Keenan, Caleb, Luke M., and Wade -- in double figure scoring on a 20-point night by Tyler J. Other highpoint contributors in the current run have been Keenan and Luke M, with the latter reaching 20-or more in four of those contests.

Bench play has also made their contributions felt. In the buzzer beater loss at Prairie City, Owen C. poured in 16 points and later scored 13 at home against Echo in league action. Byran M. hit all three of his triples and ended in double figures in the team's road win over Echo.

The JV squad has done their best to keep pace with the varsity with only a half-court heave at the buzzer on the part of Dufur keeping them from having an undefeated stretch since Winter Break as well. Their success has come largely on the defensive end where they have held all but one opponent below 40 points.


Sophomore post, Will J., has led the scoring in five of those contests averaging a little over 16-points per game with a high of 21 against Echo. His game-high 14 powered the lastest victory that avenged the earlier loss to Dufur. Junior Jeremy B has twice led the team in scoring and Freshman Remington A.-S. poured in a game and team season-high 24 in the home win over Mitchell/Spray.

More recently, Mercedez C, experienced a hyperextension of a finger at Condon that resulted in a laceration that took five stiches to close.

On the positive side, Junior Makayla M. is back and Senior Shelby R. volunteered to come out to add numbers and maturity to the young squad.

Senior Desiree W. has been the most consistent scoring threat with double figures in several contests including a season high 16 in the team's lone win over Mitchell/Spray on her home court on January 12. Freshman, Allie M. has grown in her ability to gain low post position and finish at the rim which produced 14 points in the win over the Eagle-Loggers. Sammie L. also reached double-figures with 11 in the contest. In Desiree's absence for a college visitation, Emma S. stepped up to lead the Huskies with 10 points in a close first half on the road against Condon/Wheeler.



"Be a Champion" Assembly









'Be a Champion in Life' was the title of the assembly brought to the school by the Sherman County Prevention Coalition. The program was presented by Richard Jensen a nearly lifelong resident of the greater Portland metropolitan area. The program is his story of slipping into alcohol and drug addiction after high school that led to criminal activity and incarceration in the Oregon State Penitentiary for much of his early adult life. But as the "champion" in the program's name implies, his life did not end down-and-out. Following the death of his mother during his last incarceration and the realization that relationships with his children were also at risk of ending, he determined to change his life around.

From his treatment program he became aware that the surest way to defeat bad urges and habits was to replace them with success-producing behaviors. In his case, he found those new habits by returning to community college to learn a new skill and to pick back up on an old one - wrestling. He joined the Clackamas Community College wrestling team and by his second year was able to make it to the national finals. After college, he continued to pursue that elusive championship by competing in a variety of national senior-level programs. Despite consistently placing in the top five between 2009-14, he would not guit until he claimed a championship, which he finally did at the 2016 National Folk Style wrestling tournament. Prior to that in 2009, his getting clean through his collegiate competition while in his late 30's was picked up by ESPN's Outside the Lines series and his episode won the national sports story Emmy for that year.

As he began to receive responses of how his story was inspiring others, he became inspired to develop the "Be a Champion for Life" program with its theme of inspiring others to be a part of a daily effort to live the life of a striving champion.
