

## **HUSKY BOYS 2018-19**

Perhaps to the surprise of many Big Sky prognosticators, but not to themselves, the Husky men ground their way through conference play a perfect 15-0, highlighted by an overtime win at Condon and a double digit win on the road against league runner-up Horizon Christian. Unfortunately, almost a week of lost school and going without practice left them rusty as they fell to Horizon in the District Championship final. As men, however, they quickly regrouped and focused their energies on the next goal: state tournament qualifying. This they accomplished with back-to-back 20+ point victories over North Clackamas Christian and Siletz Valley, with the seniors winning the honor of being part of a program to earn a trip to Baker City in each year of their high school careers – an amazing legacy! Their final push for a State title came to an end with a 4-point loss against Prairie City in a tight back-and-forth contest. The Huskies finished with a 31-point win over Horizon in the Consolation Semifinal before falling to Damascus Christian in the Consolation final to finish 6th in State.

Despite falling short on half of the season's goals, a number of individuals were recognized at District and State. Luke M earned Big Sky Player of the Year and was named 2<sup>nd</sup> Team State Tourney, he along with Keenan C were named to the conference First Team. Caleb F was a Second Team honoree, and Tyler J received Conference honorable mention.
