

We have had a wonderful start to the 2019-20 school year. I want to thank our students, staff, parents/guardians, and entire school community for the positive energy and dedication.

PBIS and Safety

This year we will be again focusing on our Positive Behavior Intervention and Support Program. PBIS is a school wide approach for creating a safer and more effective school by considering the following three phrases as important Life Rules: Be Safe, Be Respectful and Be Responsible. Throughout the past four years, the District Administration, Sheriff's Office and Multi-Agency Safety Committee have also implemented robust and proactive safety measures to ensure student/staff safety. During the month of September/October, we will be conducting practice fire, lockdown, bus evacuation, and earthquake drills which will include classroom visits by law enforcement and fire personnel to answer student questions.

Student Success Act Information

Signed into law in May of 2019, the Student Success Act is a historic opportunity for Oregon schools. When fully implemented this act will invest approximately \$2 billion for early learning and K-12 education, and close to \$500 million (approximately \$290,000 for Sherman County School) will go directly to Oregon school districts and eligible charter schools through the Student Investment Account. This account funds a non-competitive grant to focus on critical areas of improvement: reducing class size, increasing instructional time, addressing health and safety needs to ensure a well-rounded education. The law requires districts to determine the best investments for students in their local community while explicitly focusing on student mental and behavioral health, addressing disparities based on race or disability, and improving teaching and learning conditions. During the 2019-20 school year, we will be gathering input to enhance programs for our students from all stakeholders in the community

Hall of Honor/Homecoming Week

Our students, along with the leadership advisors, are working hard to organize and schedule exciting activities to celebrate Homecoming Week, **October 14-19**. This is always a fun time of the year for students and alumni. To culminate the week (October 19), we will be celebrating the induction of four individuals and one team into the Sherman County School District Hall of Honor at a reception that will begin at 5:30 p.m. There will also be a special presentation and celebration of 151 years of education in Sherman County (From One-Room Schools to One Campus). The Booster Club will be serving a Tri-Tip dinner between 5:30-6:15 p.m. and speakers will be sharing memories of each honoree beginning at 6:00 p.m. The public is welcome to join the celebration at 5:30 p.m. Please join us for the \$12.00 fundraising dinner to support the Booster Club as we honor all Hall of Honor Inductees. Dinner tickets can be purchased at the door or you may attend the event for free if not purchasing dinner (see more about inductees on page 7).

Meanwhile, the beginning team relying on some alternates were able to secure a Third-Place Banner.

In addition to there being little in the way of personnel change, there is similarly little in the way of course offering differences from last year or new in the way of clubs.

One new course that is being offered by Mrs. Von Borstel this year during Period 7 is Drama.

While not a new club but showing signs of excitement and growth is the Gaming Club. Mr. Dearborn has provided this after-school opportunity for students to engage in electronic gaming in his room over the past three years. However, the club was able to kick this year off with the benefit of members' hard work running concessions last year. Koby B and Joey R did the research and helped in the concession stand with other club volunteers with a goal of raising money for virtual reality goggles. Based on the club's efforts, they raised over \$900 and were able to buy two Oculus VR goggles that have been placed into club service. Club members have been learning how to utilize the goggles playing a game where flying cubes are speeding at the player (see Koby B below middle) who must use his/her 'wand' to swipe according to a direction arrow that shows with the cube. The pace of the cube is based upon a musical score that the player chooses. As Koby B pointed out, "They give us a chance to experiment and learn about electronics in a way that we would otherwise not have a chance to."

Grace May Zevely grew up in the Biglow Canyon region of the County, and, when not raising her own children, taught in classrooms throughout the county and Central Oregon region. Most notably, based upon the times, in 1919, she became the first female Sherman County Superintendent;

Captain Deron R. Kaseberg earned appointment and graduated from the United States Military Academy, West Point. After his military service, he has continued to serve the country as part of the Transportation Safety Administration;

Ron Townsend, the consummate coach, is actually represented twice in this year's induction: he is the tall gentleman in the team photo above, as its head coach, and he is an inductee in his own right as far and away the most trophied coach in Sherman history, whose list of league and state placing awards could not possibly fit on this page;

Michael S. Macnab was especially active in FFA during his Sherman High days, going on to serve as the State FFA President and, later, earn induction into the OSU College of Agricultural Sciences Hall of Fame. For his professional career, he has found a niche in leading Agribusiness and Trust organizations, but often cites his rural upbringing in Sherman County for teaching him the fundamentals for life success.

What a difference a year makes! Football season is back and in a very entertaining fashion at Sherman County with a little help from co-oping with Condon and playing the very different technique of the six-man game. The Huskies have been on the road most of September beginning with the 7-team Jamboree held in Echo that included all but one of their conference opponents. 'Conference' this season refers to 1A Special District 5 (6-Man). 1A SD 5 (6) is eight eastern Oregon individual or co-op teams: Joseph, Huntington/Harper, Prairie City/Burnt River, South Wasco, Echo, Dayville/Monument, Mitchell/Spray/Wheeler, and Sherman/Condon.

Despite being plagued with several injuries, the Huskies have dominated early opponents with their size and athleticism. Wade F directs the team from his quarterback role and was named Papa Murphy's Player of the Week after his performance against Prairie City/Burnt River Sept. 13. He scored five rushing touchdowns, with a long of 58 yards, and was 5 of 11 passing for two additional scores.

This is the third year with Coach Lewis heading the program; he is assisted by Mr. Walker.



Opportunities from Around the District

Testing Notes from Mrs. Hale SAT/PSAT/ACT/ASVAB

The SAT is one of the national standardized tests used for college admissions recommended for juniors and seniors. In addition to the standard reading, math and science knowledge skills test, the SAT also has several subject area tests required depending on the college for which admission is sought. The PSAT or pre-SAT is a similar standardized test for sophomores to provide an indication of where the student is at in their learning progress and what might be expected as a likely score on the SAT.

The ACT is an alternative college admissions test used by some universities. In addition to the basic math, reading and writing components. The nearest ACT testing site is Hood River with the next test the first weekend in April 2020, though other sites in Oregon have tests in November and February as well. The ASVAB is a test of basic reading, writing, and critical thinking skills to assess interest and aptitude This is the test the armed services use for recruitment and specialty placement after enlistment. The ASVAB will be administered at SCS on Wednesday, Oct. 23, as part of the regular morning school day. An announcement for exact time and place will be made through the intercom. Result interpretations will be available through the counseling office beginning Nov. 13th.

The SAT will be administered at the High School, Saturday, Oct. 5. Students should report to the front entrance no later than 8 AM

The PSAT will be administered on Wednesday, Oct. 24, as part of the regular morning school day. An announcement for sophomores will be made as to the exact time and place. Those results are expected back before Winter Break. Certain 'bench mark' scores achieved on the PSAT or SAT meet Oregon's essential skills levels for graduation.

RTIi and PBIS: What are those?

As most institutions, education is full of organizational terms and acronyms. Those above happen to be two that are trending in Oregon, Sherman and across the country currently. As pictured above, Mrs. R-Smith is here to explain these terms and introduce her new role directing these programs at Sherman School as she leaves the Kindergarten classroom to become SCS's RTIi/PBIS Specialist and Instructional Coach.

She reports that "RTI is a multi-tier systematic approach that Oregon directs schools to use for early identification and support of students with learning needs." The first step of RTIi begins with high-quality instruction in the classrooms and universal screening of all students.

"I will work with teachers this year as an instructional coach to support their needs in the classroom and to help them create an environment where all students are learning and making progress toward their goals," she explained. She will meet weekly with teachers to discuss instructional strategies, interventions, successes, and to make databased decisions for the future actions to promote academic achievement. PBIS is also a multi-tier approach that the District has adopted use for early identification and support of students with behavioral needs. This system is used to teach and support positive behaviors and help students to correct undesired behaviors, Mrs. R-Smith will support teachers in this area as well as lead the District PBIS leadership team. "The PBIS team and I are working to create a system of interventions that discourage undesired behaviors as well as a way to document interventions so that we might track both the needs and the success of the program," she reported.

Safe, Respectful and Responsible in Action



Above you get to witness some of the things staff are involved in on in-service Friday afternoons. There is no need for alarm, however; no actual teacher was harmed as far right attests. These photos illustrate 'Stop the Bleed' training of Sept. 20th which was led by Undersheriff James Burgett and Director of Emergency Services Shawn Payne. Over the past four years the District has partnered with a number of safety and emergency services organizations to create procedures and strategies

along with trainings in order to both keep the school protected and to keep students and staff trained to respond in the most optimum fashion should a threat or emergency situation arise.

School began with expectation station overviews of safety procedures at various environments across the school and there has been a whole-school fire drill, lockdown drill and bus evacuation drill and bus safety presentation through the first three weeks of September. Be assured: reading, math, science, and sharing were also taught!
