

Superintendent Notes and People Highlights: We Appreciate You!

In past newsletters, I have shared information about the celebrated Student Success Act. This will bring approximately \$290,000 in additional funding to the Sherman County School District. In October, November, and December we gathered input from numerous stakeholders through a survey process regarding reducing class size, increasing instructional time, addressing health and safety, and ensuring a well-rounded education. We are now examining data to prepare for the application process. During February and March we will make the plan available for public review during regular Board meetings. We are thankful for these additional funds to support our students and staff. During the past three years, the Sherman County School has focused on establishing an enhanced system of support for all of our students. Two years ago we expanded to a full-time certified K-12 Counselor/Qualified Mental Health Professional and added Student Success Support (fully funded through state-wide Measure 98 grant funds). We are currently working in conjunction with the Sherman County Court, Sherman County Sheriff's Office and Mid-Columbia Center for Living (MCCFL) to add an additional Qualified Mental Health Professional that will be dually supervised by MCCFL and the Sherman County School District. This position will be fully funded through MCCFL. We strongly believe having this additional support, as part of our team, will lead to more efficient coordinated counseling services for our students and families. We are hopeful that this position will begin by March of 2020.

He then moved to New York and was a production manager for a cable production studio. He later made his way to Sherman County in 1998. We are thankful for his time working with our students and for sharing his vast life experiences. He is always kind and jovial toward everyone he meets. US History With a Touch of a Different 'Class'





The western migration of people that gives its name to Western Civilization was intensified with the discovery of the Western Hemisphere. Students in US History this past month specifically examined that aspect of western expansion we have come to call Manifest Destiny. One of the main lures that drew people westward was the natural resources that could be exploited for their commercial benefits. On Wednesday, Jan. 8, SCS US History students explored the extraction of the beaver as one of the main resource draws to westward expansion in the US in the early 1800s and the demographic, political, economic and environmental consequences of the actions of that time period. In order that the students gain appreciation for the look and style of the beaver-skin top hat that made the creature so valuable in the 'Mountain Man' Era, Mr. Stuart acquired a modern replica for the students to model after they had watched a video presentation.
